### 3. Minutes of the meeting held on 21st May 2023

#### **ANNUAL PARISHIONER MEETING, 21st May 2023**

- i. **Opening thought and prayer:** The meeting opened with thoughts from Exodus 40, Proverbs and Romans 8, and a prayer, led by Revd. John Monaghan.
- ii. **Appointment of a clerk for the meeting:** Sue Francis, the PCC secretary, was appointed as clerk. Matt Waterfield circulated a sign-up sheet for attendees and one to record any apologies offered (one sheet for both meetings).
- iii. **Apologies for absence:** Apologies had been received from Helen Blackwell, Simon Britton, Peter Brown, Judi Brown, Louise Fazeli, Dave Fisher, Emma Nhachi, Norma Pepys-Goodchild, Graham Philpott, John and Sue Risdon, Nigel and Lorraine Roe, Elizabeth Shuli, Andrew and Sarah Smith, Steve and Margaret Riddick and Lauren Worsley.
- iv. **Minutes of the meeting held on 10 May 2022:** These were approved and signed. There were no questions or matters arising.
- v. **Election of Churchwardens:** John explained that churchwardens were elected for one year at a time. Andrew Smith was happy to continue in the role. He was proposed by Kath Baker and seconded by Tim Dennish. Celia Anderson, who had been serving as deputy warden, was proposed by Alice Oakes, and seconded by Moira Perrin. Both Andrew and Celia were enthusiastically approved. John thanked them for all that they do; he could not do it all without them. John also thanked Nigel Roe, who had been serving as churchwarden but had stood down during the year.

#### ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING, 21<sup>ST</sup> MAY 2023

John confirmed that there had not been any late nominations and explained, that as the congregation was just below 400, we were allowed 15 elected members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC).

- Apologies for absence: Apologies had been received from Helen Blackwell, Simon Britton, Peter Brown, Judi Brown, Louise Fazeli, Dave Fisher, Emma Nhachi, Norma Pepys-Goodchild, Graham Philpott, John and Sue Risdon, Nigel and Lorraine Roe, Elizabeth Shuli, Andrew and Sarah Smith, Steve and Margaret Riddick and Lauren Worsley.
- 2. Appointment of a clerk for the meeting: Sue Francis, the PCC secretary, was appointed as clerk.

- 3. **Minutes of the meeting held on 10th May 2022:** These were approved and signed. There were no questions or matters arising.
- 4. **Motion to approve a Burial Policy:** John explained that, due to limited space in the graveyard, the PCC had approved a policy (9/1/23) prohibiting the reserving new plots in advance of a death. This policy was approved by the meeting.
- 5. Election to Deanery Synod: John briefly explained the Deanery Synod system and noted that Deanery Synod representatives were ex officio members of the PCC. John thanked Gareth Davies, Gordon Goodman and Lesley Ward, who were stepping down, and Steve Riddick, who was standing again. Steve was proposed by Sarah Smith, seconded by Rachael Champness, and approved. John added that some PCC members might be encouraged to go along to the Deanery Synod and asked anyone else who might be interested to let him know.
- 6. **Elections to the Parochial Church Council:** John explained that we were allowed up to 15 elected members, but the Churchwardens, Deanery Synod representatives and clergy were ex officio members, which could make quite a large committee, so it was not essential to fill all the places.

There were six people standing for election and all were approved and elected for three years:

- Sue Francis, proposed by Michael Browne, seconded by Elizabeth Browne;
- Kath Baker, proposed by Christopher Phillimore, seconded by Jeremy Taylor;
- Sarah Wright, proposed by Emma Hartwell, seconded by Claire Taylor;
- Paul Hobbs, proposed by Celia Anderson, seconded by Julian Myrans;
- Jack Neave, proposed by Rhiannon Reeves, seconded by Adam Greenland;
- Roger Price, proposed by Stewart Fincham, seconded by John Varley.

John encouraged those present to pray for the PCC and to let him or the PCC Secretary know if there were topics that the PCC ought to be discussing. John thanked outgoing members Moira Perrin, Tim Door and Tom Nhachi, who were warmly applauded.

- 7. **Electoral Roll report**: There were now 399 people on the electoral roll (previously 400, but one person had died). There had been 20 additions and 5 deletions. John noted that this did not include the children and young people.
- 8. **PCC & Standing Committee report:** John reported that the PCC now met every two months, with sub-committees, including standing committee, in between. In response to a question about how

close we were to paying for courtyard project, Rachel Limbrick, the outgoing treasurer, replied that the courtyard project was fully paid for, but some pledges were still coming in, as some people had committed to giving over four years and there was 18 months of this left. John invited anyone who wished to see PCC minutes to email the church office.

- 9. **Churchwardens' report:** John asked if there were any questions on this report, but there were none. He again thanked the Churchwardens for all their hard work.
- 10. **Vicar's report**: John spoke of the incredible welcome he and his family had received and the many blessings and talents in the church, where there had been years and years of faithful Christian service, but also noted that, where much had been given, much was demanded. John mentioned the church weekend at home on 22<sup>nd</sup>-24th September. He encouraged people to email or call him, if they wanted to chat, or had a word from the Lord, and spoke about how encouraging it was to share testimonies. There were no questions.
- 11. **Fabric/Facilities report:** John thanked Kevin Sadler and Lorraine Yates for all their work as Facilities manager and administrator respectively, and Matt Waterfield, our new Operations Manager. There was a lot of work going on behind the scenes and a 5+ year programme of maintenance. We wanted to be faithful stewards. There was a question about the possibility of better lighting in the car park for winter evenings. John noted that we also wanted to use the courtyard and foyer better and find ways to draw visitors in, perhaps by displaying texts from Scripture.
- 12. **Other Ministry reports**: John was hugely grateful for people involved in all the different ministries and the annual report, which was also available on the website, was a wonderful snapshot, although there were also lots of other activities, like administration, hospitality and the flowers. If they were other areas to include next year, people should let him know. There were no questions.
- 13. Finance report, accounts & appointment of independent examiner: John noted that Rachel was stepping down as treasurer. We were hugely grateful to her. Rachel then gave a slide presentation on the annual accounts, noting that income had decreased from £379,000 to £368,000, partly due to the fact that courtyard donations were coming to natural end, but also due to a slight decrease in income from planned giving. People were still giving generously, despite recent challenges. There were 125 people or family units who were regular givers and giving had risen from £148,000 in 2010 to £258,000 in 2022.

Expenditure for the year had been £410,000, resulting in a deficit of £42,000, though £30,000 of this had been due to deprecation of assets, leaving an actual deficit of £12,000, slightly higher than

previous years. One of the biggest items of expenditure was the Parish Share, which, having remained the same in 2020 and 2021, had gone up to £87,000 in 2022. Long term investments showed a decrease of £7,000, so the Churchwardens would be looking at the investments.

Rachel thanked Di and Alice who did a fantastic job, managing the day-to-day finances. Rachel also thanked everyone for their support and all our amazing volunteers. In response to questions, Rachel confirmed that the figure quoted for the long-term investments represented the value of the shares, but we could spend the interest  $\mathfrak{L}3,000$ . She also confirmed that we had a  $\mathfrak{L}12,000$  deficit at a time when we hadn't been paying a youth worker's salary, but added that that would have been budgeted for. There was a deficit budget again for 2023, but it was being monitored carefully. There had been some one-off large expenditures in 2022.

John noted that we must step out in faith. We needed to increase our giving a bit and be agile. In September we would be looking at stewardship. He also noted that Parish Share, which covered the cost of having our church buildings, housing and paying the Vicar, training new clergy, and subsidising other less well-off parishes, was actually low compared with a lot of other dioceses.

Stuart Fincham said it was a great set of accounts, but asked about the £4,560 for the upkeep of St. Bartholomew's churchyard (page 12) and whether this money could be used to pay the expenses relating to churchyard maintenance. Rachael explained that these were restricted funds, received for St Bartholomew's churchyard many years ago. Andrew Smith had undertaken to look at such funds and start using them, where appropriate, instead of general funds. John asked about the Friends of St. Bartholomew's, who existed to look after the building and churchyard, and how it could be used. Gordon Goodman explained that the Friends had been set up at a time when St. Bartholomew's was about to fall down. He encouraged the Churchwardens to approach them if there was a need. A huge round of applause for Rachel followed.

The current independent examiner for the accounts was Louise Newman & Co, who were happy to continue. This was proposed by Rachel and seconded by Stewart Fincham and approved.

Jenny asked about the possibility of larger text for the new liturgy at 1030, which was being addressed, and whether there was a plan to return to normal communion. Some discussion followed, but it was not clear how everyone's individual preferences could be accommodated.

14. **Closing Prayer:** Prayers were said by Alex and John, who referred to Matthew 28. The meeting ended at 1pm.

**6. Electoral Roll report:** Currently, there are 379 on the electoral roll: 24 additions and 41 deletions.

**7. PCC & Standing Committee report:** St Andrew's and St Bartholomew's PCC works with the Vicar to promote the mission of the Church and share the leadership, management and administration of the parish.

Six new PCC members were elected in May 2023 and two were co-opted. Steve Riddick was re-elected as the Deanery Synod representative. The PCC met 6 times during the year, with Standing Committee meetings in between to prepare the agenda for the next meeting and chase up any outstanding actions.

Throughout the year, the PCC received reports on safeguarding, church finances, buildings and fabric and many other aspects of church business. At the September meeting we had the opportunity to hear from and pray for Kate, the children's worker, and Jamie, the new youth worker. At an envisioning event in October 2023 we discussed strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats (SWOT). In November and again in March, Sarah Wright presented plans for Eco Church, including a planned new prayer and nature garden. In January 2024 we had a detailed presentation from the Missions committee. We also spent time discussing the appropriate response to the General Synod's approval of the Prayers of Love and Faith.

Any member of the church who has an issue for the PCC to discuss is invited to bring it to the attention of the PCC secretary (or Revd John). Minutes are also available from the office (once formally approved). If you might be interested in standing for PCC or Deanery Synod, please have a chat with Revd. John at any point in the year.

**8. Churchwardens' report:** As Churchwardens we are tasked with monitoring, improving, and encouraging church life and also acting as peacemakers. Over the last year, Celia and I have benefitted in this from the arrival of Matt and the development of his role as Operations Manager. It is also wonderful that such a capable Youth Pastor as Jamie joined us during the year to strengthen the team helping so many teenagers in the church to develop in their faith journey. Among the more significant 'behind the scenes' improvements have been the development of the PCC HR committee to ensure that we treat our staff well, the introduction of a new Health and Safety policy and the extension of our safeguarding regime to cover the service of over 150 volunteers. It has been good to have the support of Kath Baker as a Deputy Warden and John our vicar.

Sometimes differences over various issues become passionate as we explore together what following Jesus means for us in today's world. It is vital that, as we tackle difficult issues, our church is characterised by love, encouragement, and care for one another and for those outside the church. Thank you that our job as wardens is made much easier because lots of you serve our Lord Jesus in so many ways, in church activities, in your daily lives and in the wider community.

9. Vicar's report: What a privilege to be partnering in ministry with the family at St Andrew's and St Bartholomew's as it's coming up to my second year here next month! There has been so much to give thanks to the Lord for over the past year. We continue to see lives transformed by the power of the gospel, and the hope of Jesus made known, even in the midst of darkness and difficulty. We also continue to seek to empower one another in our ministries, with Jesus (not the leadership or Vicar) as the head of our church. Working with our amazing PCC and Core Leadership team, consisting of the Wardens and full-time (or almost) staff, has been such a joy. Andrew and Celia (Wardens) have been such a source of support to me week in, week out in ministry, as has the whole team. It's been a joy watching our ministries shape, develop and grow over the past year, including Women & Men's, Sundays, Children & Youth, Outreach and Evangelism, Communications and Governance, as well as ecumenical relationships with other churches in our area and the Diocese. Mid-week there is such a buzz around the Church office with Matt Waterfield (Operations manager) bringing his incredible gifts and relational strengths to our team.

**Sunday Services** – there is a growing sense of expectancy and openness to the Holy Spirit's activity in our life as we worship and sit under his Word. It's been wonderful seeing Prayer Ministry start up again at our 9am service, and also our twice a month 'Encounter' evening services which are focusing on the gifts of the Holy Spirit this year. In terms of morning preaching themes, last year we journeyed through the Old Testament, ending with a longer series on Nehemiah. This year we have been exploring our once a month series 'Healthy Habits which keep God at the centre of everything' – as part of that, I have written a booklet which we will make available to the church. At the start of this calendar year we've also been looking at

some of the characteristics of the 'Church of Tomorrow' as we continue to listen to what the Spirit is saying to our church at this time of cultural change. We'll also be exploring the books of Galatians and Revelation later on this year.

**Leadership** – as well as investing in the staff and central leadership, we've launched a once a month leadership book club for anyone to attend. This September we may offer a more formal course such as the CPAS Growing leaders course.

**Courses –** It's been good seeing an annual pattern of courses emerging, as well as the myriad of amazing courses offered by Dan Button and GTS. We've seen Parenting in the Autumn, Alpha in Winter, Marriage in Spring. We're hoping to launch a mental-wellness course in September as well. On top of Parenting and Marriage courses for families, wouldn't it be great if we could also offer a course for 'singles' as we seek to bless and encourage all those in our church and not just those who are married.

Thoughts for the future and for your prayers – that the leadership would be increasingly diverse in terms of age, social demographics and representative of the full five-fold ministry we read about in Ephesians four. This includes those with Apostolic (pioneering new ministries in our community), Prophetic (discerning what the Spirit might be saying to our church) and Evangelistic (able to encourage and challenge the rest of us to bring the gospel to our community) giftings. If you think you have a heart for any of these three areas, please get in touch with me.

-That we would continue to be a church that holds the tension of radical holiness, alongside radical inclusion as we uphold the doctrine of marriage as Jesus taught, and extend a loving welcome to all, including those who identify as LGBTQ+. The *posture* of our PCC and Core leadership is orthodox, and our *position* is one of love and grace for all. Pray that we would get better at inclusion, increasing family acceptance, protecting against victimisation, and nourishing faith identity in LGBT+ hearts. Pray that we would learn to live well alongside those with whom we lovingly disagree, over this sensitive issue, and that above all, Christ might be glorified, and his gospel spread.

-That we would be able to use our gifts and resources to bless and encourage other churches, both individually and corporately. We've seen great examples of this as we've sent out 'workers in the harvest' like those being called to ordination (Harry, Laine, Denise), all of our mission partners (locally, nationally and abroad), helping St John's with 'Winter warmers', supporting the DEF (Diocesan Evangelical Fellowship), and using our Church as a resource for other churches, including New Wine leaders meetings.

**10. Fabric/Facilities report:** Over the past year there have been no major works undertaken. The focus has been on maintaining the existing churches and buildings. Julian Myrans has continued to provide unsung support, we are blessed to have him. In addition, the newly formed DIY Team have established themselves. The process of identifying and then fixing maintenance issues grows from strength to strength.

Moving forward we are looking to upgrade the kitchen and have identified grant bodies that we can apply to for financial support in enhancing the facilities that our many volunteers work with to provide hospitality for our church family and the wider Churchdown community.

11. Other Ministry reports: This is not an exhaustive list of the many and various ways we serve the local church and wider community and world. We hope that this offers a flavour of some of the ministries that you have been involved in and offers us all opportunities for expressing thankfulness to God, to each other, and prayer for the future. **Alpha:** Alpha is a series of group conversations that freely explore the basics of the Christian faith in an open, friendly environment. We ran an Alpha course that started in January 2024 using materials supplied by Alpha UK. Evenings started with a meal provided by members of the church, followed by watching a video

together about a specific aspect of Christian belief. Participants then broke into two discussion groups, facilitated by members of the Church, to discuss what they had seen and their own experiences and beliefs. Nine evening sessions and one full-day Saturday session were held. 14 guests attended at least one session, with the vast majority choosing to complete the course. Feedback from participants was very positive, with people finding the course helpful and supportive in exploring and developing faith. Most participants have signed up to attend the Bible Course (devised by the Bible Society), which is being run subsequent to Alpha, and a number have asked to be baptised. The Alpha format has proved to be a very successful way to invite people to explore God's love for them and we hope to run further courses.

**Bereavement Café:** The Bereavement Café provides an opportunity for anyone who has been bereaved, recently or in the past, to meet socially with others who have also been affected by the loss of a loved one. They may be struggling with their grief, feeling lonely, isolated or simply wanting someone to listen.

The 'drop-in' Café takes place in the Lounge on the second Tuesday of each month, 1.30-3.30pm. Volunteers provide a warm welcome, a friendly listening ear and space to remember those who have died, along with tea, coffee and home-made cakes.

The Café started in September 2023. Typically we have around a dozen guests each month, about half of whom are from the church family and half from the wider community. Some are 'regulars' whilst others might just come once or twice.

We give thanks that the Café is reaching out into the community and for the friendships growing among the guests and volunteers. Please pray for a raised awareness of the Bereavement Café throughout Churchdown and beyond so that we can reach more of those who are grieving with God's love and compassion. **CAMEO:** CAMEO is a lunch club. The name stands for: Come And Meet Each Other. Once a month, we offer lunch to people over the age of 65 who live in Churchdown, or who go to St Andrew's or St. Bartholomew's. The guests enjoy an opportunity to socialise and for some of them, to do this in a church setting enables them to see an otherwise unfamiliar bit of church life.

The lunch consists of a served, two course meal followed by a short period of entertainment: a quiz, a speaker, a musical group or conversation.

Over the year we make a profit and this has enabled us to make donations, the most recent being to: Churchdown Age Concern Minibus appeal, Churchdown Food Bank and the Gloucester cathedral Breakfast club for the homeless.

As a committee, we thank God for the for the volunteers who help us run this ministry and for the church kitchen, which is larger and better equipped than many other similar ones.

**Mission Team:** The church continued to support mission by providing facilities, volunteers, prayer, and financial giving to its mission partners throughout the year. The Mission Team enables this, but many aspects of church life are Missional.

Some highlights from 2023:

The Mission Team led Mission Sunday in October at both morning services. Key mission partners contributed through videos played and stalls in the main hall, including children's activities.

10% of the church's unrestricted voluntary giving plus individuals' gifts is given to mission partners. In 2023 this amounted to £39k in total, disbursed to enable to 25 mission partners - some serving close to home such as the 'Hungry No More' local Churchdown foodbank, Gloucester City Mission, and Teens In Crisis, and others in distant countries, such as Africa Inland Church planting churches in Kenya and the international work of Wycliffe Bible Translators.

A special appeal for the Turkey/Syria earthquake relief efforts raised £4.2k which was distributed through Open Doors and Samarra's Aid.

At Christmas the church participated in two schemes for children in difficult circumstances – Operation Christmas Child providing shoe boxes of gifts to poor areas of the world and locally through Angel Tree gifts for children of women prisoners in the UK.

This year I am grateful for God's provision of an additional team member, an administrative support, to assist with the data manipulation and organisation of the 180+ volunteers that St Andrew's benefits from. It has been a huge answer to prayer and has certainly impacted the role and work of the PSO in a positive way. The evolution of the spreadsheet and data around 12 steps of safer recruitment and safeguarding training continues. We are confident that anyone volunteering or wishing to volunteer with children or young people within St Andrew's is recruited in line with the 12 steps of safer recruitment. This work continues to roll out

across other teams with current focus on the pastoral care team and with a view to rolling this out across all volunteers in due course.

I am currently working on the development of a set of paperwork to support team leaders with their safer recruitment of new volunteers. This will also support team leaders to ensure that the information and training of existing volunteers is up to date. Please pray that we are quietly guided to every safeguarding situation and that there are always capable people ready to support those who are in need.

Women's Ministry: There are a number of groups and events for women at St Andrew's. Most of the women's connect groups are weekly. The women's breakfasts are termly and then we have an annual women's day conference. The women's ministries have recently worked with the youth pastor in supporting the youth girls. Through the fellowship and testimonies we share in all these women's ministries, we continue to embrace the transformative message of Christ's grace and truth. The groups are a huge encouragement and they strengthen our faith, challenge us, inspire us and it is a great place to support each other. Worship & Tech Teams: The Worship Team provides musicians and singers for the 10.30 and 18.00 services at St Andrew's. 12. Finance report and audited accounts: Over the last year as Acting Treasurer I have greatly appreciated the support of Steve Riddick, Chris Jones, Matt Waterfield and Roger Price on our Finance Committee as well as our Assistant Treasurers Alice Oakes and Di Rowe. After years of dedicated service Alice and Di have now handed over to Alison Salcombe in a new role of Finance Officer. Christopher Phillimore has stepped into another new role as Stewardship Advisor to assist people give effectively to support the work of the church and Matt Waterfield now seeks to improve the way we manage our spending. Although Rachel Limbrick left her Treasurer role over a year ago, she has been very helpful in putting together our statutory financial accounts for 2023. We hope to continue to refresh the team controlling our finances and are still looking for a new voluntary Treasurer to oversee the team.

Staff costs continue to account for nearly 40% of our expenditure with our contribution to the diocese accounting for nearly 25%. The other major areas of spending are maintaining and servicing our buildings and support for our mission partners. The vast majority of our expenditure is funded by personal giving to the church. This giving has fallen slightly over the last year and our total income is falling below expenditure. Although we think that we can cope with this fall by using reserves this year, income and expenditure will need to be brought back into balance in the medium term.
